- 1. Entries may be made Tuesday, April 23, between 1:00–5:00 pm and Wednesday, April 24, from 7:00–10:00 am. All exhibitors must be off the floor by 10:00 am April 24. **This rule will be strictly enforced**.
- 2. Entry cards for exhibits will be available at the show.
- 3. Entries, awards, and ribbons may not be removed until 4:00 pm Thursday, April 25, and must be removed by 4:10 pm that day. The committee reserves the right to discard any exhibits not removed by 4:10 pm that day.

# **SPRING INTO ART!**

4. Please email the committee at greenwichdaffodilsociety@gmail.com by April 18 if entering collections of nine or more stems to ensure adequate room for staging (Classes 190, 191, 202-205).

- 1. The floral design division may be entered individually or in a group of two people.
- 2. A "Novice Exhibitor" is someone who has never won a blue ribbon for a flower arrangement in a judged competition. If entering an exhibit with

a partner, both participants must be novices to be eligible for "novice exhibitor" status.

- 3. Exhibits should feature some daffodils in their design.
- 4. A brief statement of intent may be used in all classes and must be on a 4"x 6" index card with a maximum of 30 words written in black ink.
- 5. Accessories may be used in classes 2, 3, and 4. An "accessory" is anything other than plant material, base, mechanics, background, or container used in the design.
- 6. Dry plant material may be incorporated into any design. However, fresh plant material must predominate and be well conditioned.
- 7. Exhibitors may bring their entries to the show or may construct their Class 1 Challenge design on Wednesday, April 24, from 7:00 am to 10:00 am. The committee must pass (accept) all exhibits for entry into the show. Judging will take place on Wednesday, April 24, starting at 10:30 am.
- 8. Exhibitors must retrieve their exhibits on Thursday, April 25, between 4:00 pm and 4:10 pm. The committee will consider any exhibit not retrieved to be a donation to the show.

## CLASS 1: Art Class - Challenge Class

#### entries

Entrants are required to bring their own clippers. An interpretation of a piece of art provided by the committee at the show. The floral design committee will also provide all floral mechanics and components. Design to be staged on a 42" high pedestal with a 30" round top draped with a black floor-length cloth. Design may not exceed more than 5" beyond the edge of the pedestal in width or depth. No height restrictions. Viewed from three sides.

#### PHOTOGRAPHY DESIGN DIVISION

#### CLASS II: Impressionist Art – Pave Class 4 entries

Upon registration, entrants will be provided a photo of the piece of art to be interpreted. The Pave Design is a technique characterized by parallel or surfacecontoured insertions that create a uniform area with little or no variation in depth. Flower arrangement heights should not vary in pave arrangements. To be staged on a table 30" high. Arrangements may not exceed 24" width or depth. Viewed from all sides.

#### CLASS III: Modern Art – Parallel Design 4 entries

Creative Design in which three or more groupings of plant material and other (optional) components are placed in a strong parallel manner in a single container, or a base, or both. Staged on a 42"high pedestal with 30" round top draped with a black floor-length cloth. Design not to exceed 30" in width or depth. No height restrictions. Viewed from all sides.

- One photograph per exhibitor per class. Class 1 is novice only. Classes 2-4 are open to all photographers regardless of experience. Daffodils must be the feature in photos.
- 2. Photographs in classes 1 4 must be matted (no frame or glass).
- 3. Photograph must be at least 5" x 7" and no larger than 8" x 10", including the mat.
- 4. Name and phone number of the entrant should be written on the back of the entry, and the top of the photograph must be indicated.
- 5. Manipulated Creative Image class: The use of manipulation or alteration in any stage of the photographic process to achieve an effect significantly different from the original photograph. All representational images in a manipulated or creative technique photo

must be the work of the photographer. Non-representational enhancements, such as the addition of purchased textures, are allowed. All images and image components must have been taken, created, or generated by the exhibitor. Inclusion of images created from outside sources or created by other parties is prohibited. A 5" x 7" original photo must be included with the entry.

- 6. A still life is a work of art depicting mostly inanimate subject matter, typically commonplace objects that are either natural (food, flowers, plants, rocks, etc.) or man-made (drinking glasses, books, vases, jewelry, or coins), for example.
- 7. Entries may be delivered on Tuesday, April 23, 2024, between 1:00 pm and 5:00 pm.
- 8. An entry card must be completed by the exhibitor and placed with the entry. The committee will provide entry cards at the show or via email.
- 9. All entries must remain in place until 4:00 pm on Thursday, April 25, 2024, and must be removed by 4:10 pm. The committee reserves the right to discard exhibits not removed by 4:10 pm that day.

#### ENTRIES

#### **Rules for Horticulture Exhibits**

- 1. All classes are open to anyone who grows daffodils except where specified otherwise.
- 2. Any information on an entry tag that could compromise the anonymity of the exhibitor must be concealed during judging.
- 3. An exhibitor may make as many entries as desired in any class, provided each entry is a different cultivar or species or an entirely different collection of cultivars and/or species.
- 4. All blooms in the Horticultural Division must have been grown in the open by the exhibitor. Miniatures may be grown in protected areas.
- 5. The show committee will furnish wedging material and containers for cut flower exhibits. No daffodil foliage is permitted.
- 6. All collections of five or more stems must be exhibited with each cultivar or species in a separate container and individually labeled.
- 7. A small grower is an exhibitor who grows 50 or fewer varieties of

daffodils and has not won more than two major Daffodil Society awards. A large grower is an entrant that grows more than 50 daffodil varieties or has won two or more major American Daffodil Society (ADS) awards. An ADS judge may not enter the Small Growers Section.

8. Classes may be subdivided as needed.

## INTERMEDIATES, MINIATURES, AND SEEDLINGS

- 9. An intermediate daffodil is a standard daffodil in Divisions 1, 2, 3, 4 or 11 having a single floret whose diameter is typically between 1.5 and 3 inches. Intermediate daffodils may be entered in classes for standard daffodils as well as classes reserved for intermediate daffodils.
- 10. Miniature daffodils may be shown only in classes for miniatures. A miniature daffodil is any cultivar on the current ADS Approved List of Miniature Cultivars. Any named, numbered, or species daffodil which appears graceful, with all parts proportionally small, may be exhibited in the Miniature Classes, and is eligible for all ADS Miniature awards, except that only numbered seedlings shown by the originator shall be eligible for the ADS Miniature Rose Ribbon. A guideline when judging miniatures is that a single floreted cultivar normally possesses a flower less than 50 mm (1.97") in natural spread. For a multi-floreted miniature daffodil, the guideline measurement for the floral mass is 72 mm (2.83") in natural spread. The judges may decline to judge any exhibit exceeding these measurements at the time of judging, or penalize as they find appropriate.

11. ADS Point Scale for Judging Cut Specimens

#### Miniatures

For miniature daffodils, both cut specimens and container-grown, the judges will substitute Form and Grace for Form.

#### Three of a Kind Exhibits

In exhibits of three stems of one cultivar or species in any division, the judges may deduct up to 5 points for lack of uniformity.

### AWARDS

- 12. Each stem in an exhibit of cut flowers receiving an ADS Award must score 90 or more on the appropriate ADS Scale of Points.
- 13. Only one First, one Second, and one Third award may be given in each class. Honorable Mention awards may also be given if merited but only if a First, Second, and Third have been awarded. Awards may be withheld by the judges in any class if, in their opinion, the exhibit is not worthy. If a blue ribbon (first place) has been awarded in a class eligible for an ADS ribbon, the ADS Award may not be withheld.
- 14. The decision of the judges is final. If an error is discovered in an exhibit after completion of judging, any award placed thereon (ADS, Special, or Ribbon) shall be forfeited by the exhibitor. If an error is discovered before the judging is completed, the class must be re-judged.

### MISCELLANEOUS

- 15. The Show Committee reserves the right to subdivide classes by cultivar or color code when there are three or more worthy exhibits of the same cultivar or color code, and if a sufficient number of worthy exhibits is left in the class. Species may be subdivided by their botanical sections.
- 16. The Royal Horticultural Society System of Classification will be used. The labeling authority is Daffodils to Show and Grow as amended each year in the December ADS Daffodil Journal.
- 17. The words "pink cup", etc., define classes where that color is solid, 2W-P, or present in two adjacent zones, 2W-GPP.
- 18. The words, "pink in cup", etc., are used for classes that include both solid and rimmed cups of the same color.
- 19. "Colored" is any color other than white.
- 20. A reverse bicolor has a predominantly yellow perianth and a predominantly white cup where "predominantly" means at least two adjacent zones must be coded the designated color.

#### LABELING

21. Each cultivar or species must be correctly labeled with its name (or number) and division. The originator's name must appear on the label in American-bred classes except seedlings shown by the originator.

The originator is the person who first flowered the bulb regardless of who made the cross and/or planted the seed.

- 22. Exhibits that are not named or are incorrectly named will not be judged. Correct classification and labeling shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 23. No label may be changed, or specimen added, removed, altered, or substituted after judging has begun or after an award has been placed.
- 24. Color Code Letters are required in all classes.



First-time winners may receive the Silver Watrous Medal. Former winners receive the Watrous Ribbon. This class is open only to ADS members. Each stem must be correctly labeled and exhibited in a separate container.

## Class 192

Five miniature cultivars and/or species, three stems of each, from at least three RHS

divisions.

#### Section H – Collections

All collections of five or more stems must be exhibited with each cultivar or species in a separate container. One stem of each standard cultivar or species from any division(s) must be correctly and individually labeled. Entries in classes 193–201, 207 are eligible for the **ADS Purple Ribbon**.

# Section J – Historical Daffodil

This

section is open to all cultivars (i.e., not species) introduced or in gardens before 1940. All cultivars shall be labeled with name, division number, and year of registration (or introduction). The earliest date shown in the International Daffodil Register and Classified List 2008 and its supplements will be the authority. The Best Historic, Best Historic Three Stem, and Best Historic Collection of Five (if all 5 are Standards) are eligible for the Gold Ribbon, White Ribbon, and Purple Ribbon, respectively.

# Section K – Classic Daffodils

This Section is open to all Standard cultivars introduced from 1940–1969 inclusive. All cultivars shall be labeled with name, division number, and year of registration (or introduction). The date shown in the International Daffodil Register and Classified List 2008 and its supplements will be the authority. The Classification Committee may

subdivide each class by decade and/or division, regardless of the number or quality of exhibits each subdivision prior to judging. Daffodils in this will be judged using the cultivar scale.

# AMERICAN DAFFODIL SOCIETY AWARDS

**Gold Ribbon:** Best standard cultivar or species in the Horticulture Division, excluding the Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

White Ribbon: Best three stems of one cultivar or species of standard daffodils.

**Rose Ribbon:** Best standard seedling exhibited by its originator, excluding challenge section.

**Purple Ribbon**: Best collection of five different standard cultivars or species in the Horticulture Division of the show.

**Maroon Ribbon:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars, one stem each, colored perianth, cup paler than perianth, any division or divisions (Section H, Class 201).

**Red-White-Blue Ribbon:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars, one stem each, of American breeding or origin, any division, or divisions (Section H, Class 200).

**Marie Bozievich Ribbon**: Ribbon for best collection of twelve different cultivars and/or species of standard daffodils from at least four RHS divisions. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Bozievich Ribbon. (Section H, Class 202).

**Elise Havens Ribbon:** Ribbon for best collection of twelve cultivars of standard daffodils from not less than three divisions of RHS divisions 5 - 10. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Havens Ribbon (Section H, Class 203).

**Tom D. Throckmorton Award:** Silver Ribbon for best collection of fifteen cultivars and/or species of standard daffodils from fifteen different RHS classifications (Section H, Class 204).

**Carey E. Quinn Award:** Ribbon for a collection of twenty-four different cultivars and/or species of standard daffodils from at least five divisions. The medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Quinn Ribbon. Open only to ADS members. (Section H, Class 205).

**Miniature Gold Ribbon:** Best miniature cultivar or species in the Horticulture Division, excluding Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

Miniature White Ribbon: Best three stems of same miniature cultivar or species.

**Miniature Rose Ribbon:** Best miniature seedling exhibited by its originator, excluding the Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

Lavender Ribbon: Best collection of five different miniature cultivars and/or species

(Section G, Classes 188,189 & Youth Section I, Class -211).

**Miniature Red-White-Blue Ribbon:** Best collection of five different miniature cultivars, one stem each of American breeding (Section G, Class 189).

**Delia Bankhead Ribbon:** Best collection of nine miniature cultivars and/or species, one stem each from at least three different RHS divisions (Section G, Class 190).

**Roberta C. Watrous Award:** Ribbon for a collection of twelve different cultivars and/or species of miniature daffodils from at least three divisions. This ribbon may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Watrous Ribbon. Open only to ADS members. (Section G, Class 191).

**Youth Ribbon:** Best cultivar or species exhibited in the Youth Section. (Section I, Classes 209–211).

Youth Collection Ribbon: Best collection of five different cultivars and/or species, all standards, or all miniatures, in the Youth Section (Class 211)

**Small Growers Ribbon:** Best cultivar or species exhibited in the Small Growers Section (Section C).

**Historic Bloom Ribbon**: Best pre-1940 cultivar, standard or miniature, in the Historic Section (Section J).

**Historic Best of Three Ribbon:** Best three stems of one pre-1940 cultivar, standard or miniature, in the Historic Section (Section J, Class 213).

**Historic Daffodil Collection of Five Ribbon:** Best collection of five different pre- 1940 standard cultivars in the Historic Section. (Section J, Class 214)

**Best Classic in Single-Stem Ribbon:** Best cultivar from a class of single stems of standard cultivars in the Classic Section. (Section K, Class 215).

**Best Classic Three-Stem Ribbon:** Best three stems of one classic standard cultivar in the Classic Section (Section K, Class 216).

**Best Classic Collection of Five Ribbon:** Best collection of five different classic standard cultivars from the Classic Section. (Section K, Class 217).
