1. Entries may be made Tuesday, April 22, between 1:00–5:00 pm and Wednesday, April 23, from 7:00–10:00 am. All exhibitors must be off the floor by 10:00 am April 23. **This rule will be strictly enforced.**
2. Entry cards for exhibits will be available at the show.
3. Entries, awards, and ribbons may not be removed until 4:00 pm Thursday, April 24 and must be removed by 4:10 pm that day. The committee reserves the right to discard any exhibits not removed by 4:10 pm that day.
4. Please email the committee at greenwichdaffodilsociety@gmail.com by April 18 if entering collections of nine or more stems to ensure adequate room for staging (Classes 190, 191, 202-205).

ARTISTIC DIVISION SCHEDULE

CYCLING INTO SPRING

FLORAL DESIGN DIVISION

Rules for Floral Design Division

1. The floral design division may be entered individually or in a group of two people.
2. A “Novice Exhibitor” is someone who has never won a blue ribbon for a flower arrangement in a judged competition. If entering an exhibit with a partner, both participants must be novices to be eligible for “novice exhibitor” status.
3. Exhibits should feature some daffodils in their design.
4. A brief statement of intent may be used in all classes and must be on a 4”x 6” index card with a maximum of 30 words written in black ink.
5. Accessories may be used in classes 2, 3, and 4. An “accessory” is anything other than plant material, base, mechanics, background, or container used in the design.
6. Dry plant material may be incorporated into any design. However, fresh plant material must predominate and be well conditioned.
7. Exhibitors may bring their entries to the show or may construct their Class 1 Challenge design on Wednesday, April 23, from 7:00 am to 10:00 am. The committee must pass (accept) all exhibits for entry into the show. Judging will take place on Wednesday, April 23, starting at 10:30 am.
8. Exhibitors must retrieve their exhibits on Thursday, April 24, between 4:00 pm and 4:10 pm. The committee will consider any exhibit not retrieved to be a donation to the show.
9. All exhibitors must pre-register with the committee by Wednesday, April 16, 2025, at greenwichdaffodilsociety@gmail.com Attn: Floral Design.

FLORAL DESIGN SCHEDULE OF CLASSES

CLASS 1: Cycling into Spring - Challenge Class **4 entries**

An interpretation of a piece of art provided by the Maggie Day Arts Cooperative. The floral design committee will also provide all floral mechanics and components. Entrants are required to bring their own clippers. No height restrictions. Viewed from three sides.

CLASS 2: Spring in a Basket - Pot et fleur **6 entries**

A design consisting of rooted material (in or out of pots) and cut flowers and/or foliage in water or conditioned to last the life of the show assembled in a bicycle basket provided by the committee. To be staged on a table 30" high. Arrangements may not exceed 24" width or depth. Viewed from three sides.

CLASS 3: What Spokes to You - A Contemporary Design **4 entries**

A floral design not following traditional styles, using imagination and creativity to devise new approaches to the selection and organization of plant material and other components according to the principles and elements of design. Staged on a 30" high rectangular tabletop draped with a black floor-length cloth. Design not to exceed 24" in width or depth. No height restrictions. Viewed from all sides.

PHOTOGRAPHY DESIGN DIVISION

Rules for Photography Design Division

1. One photograph per exhibitor per class. Class 1 is novice only. Classes 2-4 are open to all photographers regardless of experience. Daffodils must be the feature in photos.
2. Photographs in classes 1 – 3 must be mounted on foam core and may not be over-matted. Overall dimension of entry must be a minimum of 36" and not exceed 50" in total perimeter measurement.
3. Name and phone number of the entrant should be written on the back of the entry, and the top of the photograph must be indicated.
4. Manipulated Creative Image class: The use of manipulation or alteration in any stage of the photographic process to achieve an effect significantly different from the original photograph. All representational images in a manipulated or creative technique photo must be the work of the photographer. Non-representational enhancements, such as the addition of purchased textures, are allowed. All images and image components must have been taken, created, or generated by the exhibitor. Inclusion of images created from outside sources or created by other parties is prohibited. A 5" x

7" original photo must be included with the entry.

5. Entries may be delivered on Tuesday, April 22, 2025, between 1:00 pm and 5:00 pm.
6. An entry card must be completed by the exhibitor and placed with the entry. The committee will provide entry cards at the show or via email.
7. All entries must remain in place until 4:00 pm on Thursday, April 24, 2025, and must be removed by 4:10 pm. The committee reserves the right to discard exhibits not removed by 4:10 pm that day.

HORTICULTURE DIVISION SCHEDULE

Rules for Horticulture Exhibits

ENTRIES

1. All classes are open to anyone who grows daffodils except where specified otherwise.
2. Both top and bottom of entry cards should be completely filled in. Any information on an entry card that could compromise the anonymity of the exhibitor must be concealed during judging.
3. An exhibitor may make as many entries as desired in any class, provided each entry is a different cultivar or species or an entirely different collection of cultivars and /or species.
4. All blooms in the Horticultural Division must have been grown in the open by the exhibitor. Miniatures may be grown in protected areas.
5. The show committee will furnish wedging material and containers for cut flower exhibits. No daffodil foliage is permitted.
6. All collections of five or more stems must be exhibited with each cultivar or species in a separate container and individually labeled.
7. A small grower is an exhibitor who grows 50 or fewer varieties of daffodils and has not won more than two major Daffodil Society awards. A large grower is an entrant that grows more than 50 daffodil varieties or has won two or more major American Daffodil Society (ADS) awards. An ADS judge may not enter the Small Growers Section.
8. Classes may be subdivided as needed.

INTERMEDIATES, MINIATURES, AND SEEDLINGS

9. An intermediate daffodil is a standard daffodil in Divisions 1, 2, 3, 4 or 11 having a single floret whose diameter is typically between 1.5 and 3 inches. Intermediate daffodils may be entered in classes for standard daffodils as well as classes reserved for intermediate daffodils.
10. Miniature daffodils may be shown only in classes for miniatures. A guideline when entering or judging miniatures is that a single-floreted cultivar normally possesses a flower less than 50 mm (1.97") in natural spread. For a multi-floreted miniature daffodil, the guideline measurement for the floral mass is 72 mm (2.83") in natural spread. The judges may penalize any exhibit exceeding these measurements at the time of judging or decline to judge them as they find appropriate. Any named, numbered, or species daffodil which appears graceful, with all parts proportionally small, may be exhibited in the Miniature Classes, and is eligible for all ADS Miniature awards, except that only numbered seedlings shown by the originator shall be eligible for the ADS Miniature Rose Ribbon.

Miniatures

For miniature daffodils, both cut specimens and container-grown, the judges will substitute Form and Grace for Form.

Three of a Kind Exhibits

In exhibits of three stems of one cultivar or species in any division, the judges may deduct up to 5 points for lack of uniformity.

AWARDS

- Each stem in an exhibit of cut flowers receiving an ADS Award must score 90 or more on the appropriate ADS Scale of Points.
- Only one First, one Second, and one Third award may be given in each class. Honorable Mention awards may also be given if merited but only if a First, Second, and Third have been awarded. Awards may be withheld by the judges in any class if, in their opinion, the exhibit is not worthy. If a blue ribbon (first place) has been awarded in a class eligible for an ADS ribbon, the ADS Award may not be withheld.
- The decision of the judges is final. If an error is discovered in an exhibit after completion of judging, any award placed thereon (ADS, Special, or Ribbon) shall be forfeited by the exhibitor. If an error is discovered before the judging is completed, the class must be re-judged.

MISCELLANEOUS

- The Show Committee reserves the right to subdivide classes by cultivar or color code when there are three or more worthy exhibits of the same cultivar or color code, and if a sufficient number of worthy exhibits is left in the class. Species may be subdivided by their botanical sections.
- The Royal Horticultural Society System of Classification will be used. The labeling authority is Daffodils to Show and Grow as amended

each year in the December ADS Daffodil Journal.

17. The words “pink cup”, etc., define classes where that color is solid, 2W- P, or present in two adjacent zones, 2W-GPP.
18. The words, “pink in cup”, etc., are used for classes that include both solid and rimmed cups of the same color.
19. “Colored” is any color other than white.
20. A reverse bicolor has a predominantly yellow perianth and a predominantly white cup where “predominantly” means at least two adjacent zones must be coded the designated color.

LABELING

21. Each cultivar or species must be correctly labeled with its name (or number) and division. The originator’s name must appear on the label in American-bred classes except seedlings shown by the originator. The originator is the person who first flowered the bulb regardless of who made the cross and/or planted the seed.
22. Exhibits that are not named or are incorrectly named will not be judged. Correct classification and labeling shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
23. No label may be changed, or specimen added, removed, altered, or substituted after judging has begun or after an award has been placed.
24. Color Code Letters are required in all classes.

HORTICULTURE SCHEDULE OF CLASSES

Section A, B & C – Standard Daffodils

Section A – Single Stem for Large Growers

Entrants who grow more than 50 daffodil cultivars and /or species or have won 2 or more major ADS awards. All entries are standard single stems.

Section B – Three Stems for All Growers

Three stems, one cultivar or species. Exhibited in block with single large test tube. All entries are standard single stems.

Section C – Single Stem for Small Growers

Entrants who grow 50 or fewer standard cultivars and /or species and have not won 2 or more major ADS awards. All entries are standard single stems.

Section G – Miniature Collections

For the correct labeling procedure, see Rules No. 21–24.

Class 188 **ADS Lavender Ribbon**
Five cultivars or seedlings, one stem each and/or species, any division.

Class 189 **Miniature Red-White-Blue Ribbon**
Five cultivars or seedlings of American breeding, one stem each. This class is eligible for the **ADS Lavender Ribbon**.

Class 190 **Delia Bankhead Ribbon**
Nine cultivars and/or species, one stem each from at least three different RHS divisions.

Class 191: Open only to ADS members. **Roberta C. Watrous Award**
Twelve cultivars and/or species of miniature daffodils from at least three RHS divisions. First-time winners may receive the Silver Watrous Medal. Former winners receive the Watrous Ribbon. This class is open only to ADS members. Each stem must be correctly labeled and exhibited in a separate container.

Class 192 **Miniature Bronze Award**
Five miniature cultivars and/or species, three stems of each, from at least three RHS divisions.

Section H – Collections

All collections of five or more stems must be exhibited with each cultivar or species in a separate container. One stem of each standard cultivar or species from any division(s) must be correctly and individually labeled. Entries in classes 193–201, 207 are eligible for the **ADS Purple Ribbon**.

Section I – Youth Division

Exhibitors 18 years of age or younger. Flowers must be entered by the student, not a parent or other adult. Youth may enter other classes for which they qualify. Youth blooms will be exhibited in bottles provided by the committee.

Section J – Historical Daffodil

This section is open to all cultivars (i.e., not species) introduced or in gardens before 1940. All cultivars shall be labeled with name, division number, and year of registration (or introduction). The earliest date shown in the International Daffodil Register and Classified List 2008 and its supplements will be the authority. The Best Historic, Best Historic Three Stem, and Best Historic Collection of Five (if all 5 are Standards) are eligible for the Gold Ribbon, White Ribbon, and Purple Ribbon, respectively.

Section K – Classic Daffodils

This Section is open to all Standard cultivars introduced from 1940–1969 inclusive. All cultivars shall be labeled with name, division number, and year of registration (or introduction). The date shown in the International Daffodil Register and Classified List 2008 and its supplements will be the authority. The Classification Committee may subdivide each class by decade and/or division, regardless of the number or quality of exhibits each subdivision prior to judging. Daffodils in this will be judged using the cultivar scale.

AMERICAN DAFFODIL SOCIETY AWARDS

Gold Ribbon: Best standard cultivar or species in the Horticulture Division, excluding the Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

White Ribbon: Best three stems of one cultivar or species of standard daffodils.

Rose Ribbon: Best standard seedling exhibited by its originator, excluding challenge section.

Purple Ribbon: Best collection of five different standard cultivars or species in the Horticulture Division of the show.

Maroon Ribbon: Best collection of five different standard cultivars, one stem each, colored perianth, cup paler than perianth, any division or divisions (Section H, Class 201).

Red-White-Blue Ribbon: Best collection of five different standard cultivars, one stem each, of American breeding or origin, any division, or divisions (Section H, Class 200).

Marie Bozievich Ribbon: Ribbon for best collection of twelve different cultivars and /or species of standard daffodils from at least four RHS divisions. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Bozievich Ribbon. (Section H, Class 202).

Elise Havens Ribbon: Ribbon for best collection of twelve cultivars of standard daffodils from not less than three divisions of RHS divisions 5 - 10. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Havens Ribbon (Section H, Class 203).

Tom D. Throckmorton Award: Silver Ribbon for best collection of fifteen cultivars and /or species of standard daffodils from fifteen different RHS classifications (Section H, Class 204).

Carey E. Quinn Award: Ribbon for a collection of twenty-four different cultivars and /or species of standard daffodils from at least five divisions. The medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Quinn Ribbon. Open only to ADS members. (Section H, Class 205).

Miniature Gold Ribbon: Best miniature cultivar or species in the Horticulture Division, excluding Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

Miniature White Ribbon: Best three stems of same miniature cultivar or species.

Miniature Rose Ribbon: Best miniature seedling exhibited by its originator, excluding the Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

Lavender Ribbon: Best collection of five different miniature cultivars and /or species (Section G, Classes 188,189 & Youth Section I, Class -211).

Miniature Red-White-Blue Ribbon: Best collection of five different miniature cultivars, one stem each of American breeding (Section G, Class 189).

Miniature Bronze Ribbon: Best collection of five miniature cultivars and / or species, three stems of each from at least three different RHS divisions (Section G, Class 192).

Delia Bankhead Ribbon: Best collection of nine miniature cultivars and / or species, one stem each from at least three different RHS divisions (Section G, Class 190).

Roberta C. Watrous Award: Ribbon for a collection of twelve different cultivars and / or species of miniature daffodils from at least three divisions. This ribbon may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Watrous Ribbon. Open only to ADS members. (Section G, Class 191).

Youth Ribbon: Best cultivar or species exhibited in the Youth Section. (Section I, Classes 209–211).

Youth Best of Three Ribbon: Best three stems of one cultivar or species, standard or miniature, in the Youth Section (Class 210).

Youth Collection Ribbon: Best collection of five different cultivars and / or species, all standards, or all miniatures, in the Youth Section (Class 211).

Small Growers Ribbon: Best cultivar or species exhibited in the Small Growers Section (Section C).

Historic Bloom Ribbon: Best pre-1940 cultivar, standard or miniature, in the Historic Section (Section J).

Historic Best of Three Ribbon: Best three stems of one pre-1940 cultivar, standard or miniature, in the Historic Section (Section J, Class 213).

Historic Daffodil Collection of Five Ribbon: Best collection of five different pre- 1940 standard cultivars in the Historic Section. (Section J, Class 214)

Joe Hamm Award: Best collection of twelve different pre-1940 standard cultivars from at least four RHS divisions. (Section J, Class 215).

Best Classic Ribbon: Best standard cultivar from the Classic Section (Section K, Class 216).

Best Classic Three-Stem Ribbon: Best three stems of one classic standard cultivar in the Classic Section (Section K, Class 217).

Best Classic Collection of Five Ribbon: Best collection of five different classic standard cultivars from the Classic Section. (Section K, Class 218).

Best Intermediate Ribbon: Best intermediate-size cultivar from the Intermediate Section, any standard collection, or from any standard entry in the Youth or Small Growers Sections. (Section D or from Sections H, I, or C).

Best Intermediate Three-Stem Ribbon: Best set of three intermediate cultivars in the Intermediate Section (Section D) or in standard collection classes Section B.

Best Intermediate Collection of Five Ribbon: Best collection of five different intermediate cultivars in (Section H, Class 199)

Silver Ribbon: Awarded to the exhibitor winning the most first place (blue) ribbons in the Horticulture Division.

Harry I Tuggle Jr. Award: Best collection of three stems each of twelve different cultivars and/or species from at least three divisions. (Section H, Class 204A)

Wells Knierim Award: Best In Show in Photography Classes 1–5

Youth Photography Ribbon: Best Photograph in Photography Class 5
